The Community Connectors program, a part of the Community Refugee and Immigration services organization, understands the power of one.

By connecting mentors with middle- and high-school-age immigrant and refugee students, we provide emotional, behavioral, and educational support to help them meet their goals, enrich their lives, and develop deep relationships that can last a lifetime. What we do goes far beyond borders, language barriers, or political divides. Our students and their families have overcome so many barriers to get here and when we connect them with caring mentors to share experiences, opportunities, knowledge, and support, both mentors and mentees open doors to new experiences, open minds to new ideas, and open pathways to even greater potential. Jeremy is the person behind the program. He facilitates experiences, cultivates relationships, and builds trust among people from all walks of life. With a strong background in public service and a long-held passion for helping youth, Jeremy has helped the program grow from 20 mentees to the more than 100 it now serves. You'll find him in schools across central Ohio, exchanging jokes, imparting knowledge, and acting as a conduit that connects mentors, mentees, parents, business, education, and community leaders to resources that will help them reach their goals.
